

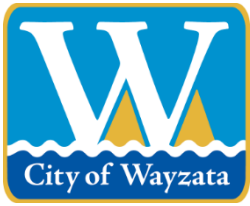

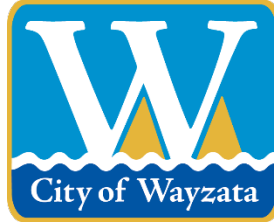

Parks and Trails Board Meeting Minutes
Wednesday, November 16, 2022

Attendees: Vice Chair Merrily Babcock, Jon Erickson, Sarah Showalter, Sarah Randolph, and Ty Purdy

Staff: Parks Planner, Nick Kieser

Guests: Ilja Gregor

1. **Call to Order and Roll Call:** Meeting was called to order at 6:36 pm.
2. **Approval of Agenda:** Agenda was approved as shown. A motion to accept the agenda by Randolph and seconded by Babcock. Approved 5-0.
3. **Approval of Minutes:** Motion to approve minutes as amended by Randolph and seconded by Erickson. Approved 5-0.
4. **Public Comments:** Ilja Gregor provided a public comment in regards to the proposed plan for the reconstruction of the tennis courts and potential pickleball courts at Bell Courts. Gregor noted that he is support of the reconstruction of the courts and especially in support of incorporating dedicated pickleball courts. When a future plan set is created and reviewed by the Parks and Trails Board, Gregor stated that would like to help to ensure the plans meet the desired requirements for the best potential play.
5. **Old Business.**
 - a. **CIP Discussion Update:** Staff gave an update on the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) with specific changes in response to the City Council workshop discussion. Staff noted that the Middle School tennis courts are planned for reconstruction in 2023. The School District does not want to add dedicated pickleball courts and want to keep four doubles tennis courts. From the discussions with the tennis court consultants, they believe that Bell Courts are in worse condition compared to the Middle School courts so they recommend Bell Courts to be completed first or alongside the Middle School courts. The City has received estimates for both of the tennis court reconstructions, one from Court Surfaces and Repair who resurface the courts and then Bituminous Roadway does the actual re-construction of courts. The updated CIP notes that both the tennis courts reconstructions are to be in 2023 along with the creation of the construction plan set in 2023.

Babcock asked for a description breakdown of each item that is proposed for the 2023 CIP so we can better understand what each item means.

The next major change to the updated CIP is that the creation of Klapprich Park design development and construction plans are listed in 2023. This would require a consultant to put these plans together based on what is noted in the Parks and Trails Master Plan. A line item is listed in 2024 for construction of the updates and improvements to Klapprich Park. Staff is working to get a proposal from a consulting firm to put together the tennis court plans and the plans for Klapprich Park for the Board to review.

- b. **Warming House Enclosure:** Staff stated that an estimate has been received to have a plastic vinyl enclosure around the open-area at the Klapprich Park warming house. The estimate was over \$30,000 so this project would be more expensive than originally thought. Staff noted that this project would be beneficial to bring up and incorporate in the design development phase of the overall Klapprich Park updates.
- c. **Memorial Tree Program:** Babcock is working on the Memorial Tree Program. There are a couple of different options for the tree program including the possibility of fruit trees.
- d. **Discuss Winter Activities:** The Board discussed that they would like to plan Family Skate Day again. The event will be planned for Sunday, January 8th from 1:00pm – 4:00pm. Staff will work to get this event in the December Wayzata Portal to advertise the event. Showalter will check with the mini donut vendor that came to the event last year to see if they can come on that date.

Staff also noted that they are in discussions with Wayzata Community Ed about their capacity to hold any activities or events this winter. Community Ed stated that they could have the capacity for a few activities or events this year and can have a more detailed discussion about holding more programmed classes during the winter next year. Staff will bring forward any ideas Community Ed comes up with to the Board for review.

The Board also noted that they would like to have more skate aids at the skate rink. Staff stated they will look into buying more skate aids.

New Business: None.

Other Business.

- a. **Budget Update through October 2022** – Discussion of removing the operating budget each month since the Board does not review that aspect of the budget.
- b. **Communications Recap** – Babcock will work to get the name of the new contact at Cargill who is in charge of the free tree giveaway program. Babcock also noted that Give to the Max Day is on Thursday, November 18.
- c. **Park & Trails Board Work Plan** – Staff included an updated work plan for 2023-2025 based on the updated CIP.
- d. **Staff Updates** – The Public Works Department have been working to stay on top of the snow that has been falling. Staff plans to flood the ice rink sometime in

December based on the weather. Babcock noted that the City should look into the work Great River Greening does in the communities and should try to get help to remove buckthorn from Big Woods/Nature Preserve and other maintenance items for those areas.

Adjourn: Next meeting is on Wednesday, December 21th 6:30pm. The meeting was adjourned at 7:46. Motion by Purdy and seconded by Erickson.

The Parks and Trails Board does not have a budget for any winter activities/events.

BACKGROUND:

Family Skate Day

Family Skate Day was scheduled for January 8 had to be canceled due to weather. The Board can discuss if and when this event can be rescheduled.

Community Ed Events/Activities

Staff discussed the potential for Community Ed to hold events this winter, such as skating lessons, snowshoeing, and/or a broomball league/tournament. Community Ed noted that they are not able to offer any of those activities this winter. The reason is that they do not offer any outdoor winter programs currently, so they do not have direct access to vendors/partners who have adequate credentials and equipment for this winter. Their team is currently recruiting those vendors for next winter.

Community Ed did note that they could still hold a family winter carnival alongside the Wayzata High School Volunteer Club if the Board would like to pursue that option.

Maple Tree Tapping

The Board can discuss the future maple tree tapping event and if any changes are necessary. Staff has provided an update that last year the City had a total of 27 tree tapping kits. 19 of those kits were lent to residents and 6 were never returned. Therefore, the City has 21 kits total left.

The Board can discuss if more kits should be purchased. The Board can also discuss how the event should be programmed this year. Last year the Board offered a DIY version of the event, but this year the tapping could go back to the communal version.

Klapprich Ice Rink Mats

Staff recommends purchasing new rubber mats for the Klapprich Park ice rink. The current mats are in poor condition. A quote is attached to the packet which would replace all the rubber mats inside and outside the warming house. Staff would like a recommendation from the Board on purchasing the mats for \$4,575.80.

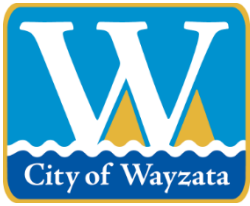

Task 1 – Project Management (\$3,809)

Project management will be performed throughout the course of the project. The following subtasks are included as part of Project Management:

- 1.1 Attend project update meetings with City staff. This will include developing the agenda, preparing handouts and graphics as necessary, and attending the meetings.
- 1.2 Attend and lead an open house meeting with City staff and neighborhood residents and prepare exhibits and meeting documents. This will include Landscape Architecture support such as developing graphics of plans, typical sections, and specifications.
- 1.3 Work with project team to coordinate project deliverables, schedule, and budget.

Deliverables: Two (2) meetings with City to coordinate and discuss options, Open House meeting and graphics.

Task 2 – Klapprich Park - Design, Bidding, & Construction Services (\$30,183)

Task 2 includes improvements to Klapprich Park such as installing a new trail and grading for ball fields, future playground areas, and a future parking lot expansion. This project will also include investigating local drainage issues, replacing existing drain tile, and minor storm sewer work.

- 2.1 This task consists of developing construction plans, specifications, and bidding documents for all recommended grading work, trail installation, and storm improvements.
- 2.2 Landscape Architecture support including developing plans and associated details for proposed park improvements. Attend up to two meetings during construction along with review of shop drawings provided by the contractor.
- 2.3 Provide construction staking and, if needed, construction administration.

Deliverables: Draft Plans, Final Plans, Specifications, Bid Documents, Bidding Support, and Construction Staking.

Plans for the project are anticipated to include a cover sheet, SEQ, details, trail and storm sewer plans, grading plans, landscape plans, and cross sections. In addition, a cost estimate will be developed to verify consistency between the proposed improvements and the City's budget.

Task 1 – Project Management (\$3,089)

Project management will be performed throughout the course of the project. The following subtasks are included as part of Project Management:

- 1.1 Attend project update meetings with City staff. This will include developing the agenda, preparing handouts and graphics as necessary, and attending the meetings.
- 1.2 Attend and lead an open house meeting with City staff and neighborhood residents and prepare exhibits and meeting documents. This will include Landscape Architecture support such as developing graphics of plans, typical sections, and tennis and pickleball court specifications.
- 1.3 Work with project team to coordinate project deliverables, schedule, and budget.

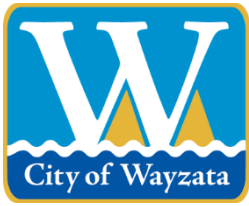

Our neighborhood would love the following seasonal enhancements for Margaret Circle Park:

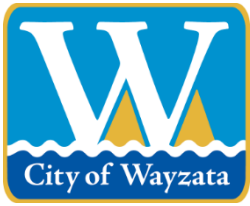
- hockey nets (winter)

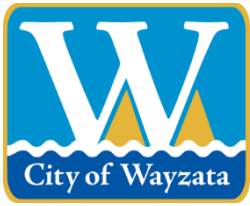

**CITY OF WAYZATA
PARKS AND TRAILS BOARD
AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS
(Adopted December 16, 2021)**

ARTICLE I – AUTHORITY AND MISSION

1.1 The Wayzata Parks and Trails Board (the “Board”) was created as an advisory commission by action of the Wayzata City Council on July 7, 2012, pursuant to Resolution No. 34-2012 and the Council authority under Section 18 of the City Charter to appoint such permanent or temporary commissions as it so desires with advisory powers to investigate any subject of interest to the municipality.

1.2 These Bylaws set forth the mission of the Board, and provide the guidelines for the meetings, internal management, and organization of the Board.

1.3 The mission of the Board shall be to provide recommendations to the City Council for the preservation, protection, enhancement and promotion of a healthy parks and trails system in the City of Wayzata, for the benefit and enjoyment of all community members and visitors, in accordance with the City’s Parks and Trails Master Plan.

ARTICLE II – CARRYING OUT THE MISSION OF THE BOARD

2.1 In carrying out the mission of the Board, the Board shall pursue the following goals in accordance with the Parks and Trails Master Plan that has been approved by City Council:

- a. Develop a variety of active and passive parks and programs that are accessible to all Wayzata residents.
- b. Ensure each park is well connected, bikeable and pedestrian friendly.
- c. Support resident’s desire and ability to stay healthy, active, and engaged in the community.
- d. Create enticing parks with activities and programming for all seasons.
- e. Foster environmental and economic sustainability that protects Wayzata’s water and natural resources.
Create a multi-generational park system that builds community, attracts young families and supports aging in place.

2.2 The Board may conduct studies and hold public informational meetings on matters related to the mission and goals of the Board, and as directed by the City Council. The Board shall periodically make recommendations to the Council on the goals of the Board.

ARTICLE III – MEETINGS

3.1 Regular Meetings. Regular meetings of the Board will be held in the Wayzata City Council Chambers at City Hall located at 600 East Rice Street at 6:30 p.m. on the third (3rd) Wednesday of

each month, or at such other time and place designated by the Board. Meetings are intended to end no later than 9:30 p.m. All meetings will be open to the public unless otherwise provided by law.

3.2 Special Meetings. Special meetings may be called by the City Council or by the Chair of Board after consultation with City staff and other members of the Board.

3.3 Notice of Meetings. Written notice of all regular and special meetings, setting forth the time, place and agenda of such meeting, will be provided in advance to members of the Board and the general public in accordance with City practices and Minnesota law.

3.4 Agendas and Meeting Materials. An agenda for each meeting, along with supporting information and materials, will be prepared by City staff and will be delivered to all members of the Board a minimum of three (3) days in advance of each meeting.

3.5 Minutes. Minutes of each meeting that have been approved by the Board will be forwarded by the Secretary to the City Clerk for publication to the City's website within 30 days of approval by the Board.

3.6 Workshops. Workshop meetings may be scheduled when necessary or as directed by City Council or the staff liaison to provide information and updates to the Board. The workshops will be held at 5:00 P.M. preceding a regular monthly meeting of the Board, or at another time as may be designated by the Chair and duly noticed. Workshops will be open to the public unless otherwise provided by law, and shall be properly noticed one week prior to the scheduled meeting date.

ARTICLE IV – MEMBERS

4.1 Membership. Members of the Board shall be appointed by the City Council. The Board will consist of seven (7) members, six (6) of whom must be residing within the corporate limits of the City of Wayzata. One member of the Board may be an eligible voter and non-resident of Wayzata who has an interest in the parks and/or trails improvements in the City.

4.2 Terms. Members shall be appointed for a term of three (3) years. Any vacancy on the Board will be filled as soon as practical by an appointment of the City Council, and such appointment will be for the unexpired term of the vacating member.

4.3 Absenteeism. If any Board member fails to attend three (3) regular meetings during a calendar year, City staff will so advise the City Council with a recommendation for action, which may include the removal of the member from the Board by the City Council. Members must notify the Chair and staff liaison when an absence is anticipated.

4.4 Expenses. Members will serve without compensation except that direct expenses for City approved-training will be paid for by the City.

4.5 Training. The Chair, Mayor, and/or City staff will meet with each new Board member following appointment to explain Board procedures and to answer questions. City staff will provide new members with information and materials that pertain to Board duties, recent actions, and current issues being addressed by the Board.

4.6 Resignation. A member who wishes to resign must submit a written resignation to the Chair and staff liaison, who in turn will forward it to the City Council. Such resignation shall be effective upon acceptance by the City Council or such other date as specified in the resignation.

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS

5.1 Officers. The officers of the Board shall consist of a Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary. All officers must be members of the Board.

5.2 Duties of the Chair. The Chair will preside at all meetings, appoint members to committees, liaise with the Council, appoint non-voting representatives or liaisons to assist the Board, rule on procedural questions (subject to reversal by a two-thirds vote of those members in attendance), meet with all newly appointed members, exercise the same voting rights as other members and carry out such other duties as are assigned by the Board or by the City Council. If the chair is absent, the Vice Chair shall assume the duties of the Chair or such other designee of the Chair. If the Chair and Vice Chair are absent for a meeting and no other member is designated, the Board can assign duties of the Chair for that meeting to any Board member.

5.3 Duties of the Vice Chair. The Vice Chair will act in the absence or inability to act of the Chair and in such instances the Vice Chair will have the powers and functions of the Chair.

5.4 Duties of the Secretary. The Secretary will be responsible for the taking of and preparing minutes of each meeting of the Board. The Secretary for each meeting will be assigned by the Staff Liaison at the first meeting of each year.

5.5 Staff Liaison. A member of City staff shall be designated by the City Manager as the Staff Liaison to the Board. The Staff Liaison shall be responsible for:

- A. Securing, supervising and directing any personnel required for work to be accomplished by the Board;
- B. Maintaining any appropriate files as deemed necessary by the Board, including files of minutes, publication or meetings, and meeting agendas;
- C. Managing and reporting on funds associated with Wayzata parks and trails;
- D. Coordinating documents among Board members in accordance with Minnesota Open Meeting laws and requirements;
- E. Implementing Parks and Trails initiatives (e.g., park and trail development and maintenance), and
- F. Any other responsibilities assigned by the Chair or Board.

5.6 Terms. The officers of the Board shall be elected by the members by open ballot at the first regular meeting of the Board in January or as soon as practical after that date. The terms of office for the Chair and Vice Chair will be for one (1) year. The Board's officers will serve until the expiration of their term, or their earlier resignation or removal.

5.7 Date of Office. Newly elected officers will take office at the first regular meeting after being elected.

5.8 Vacancies. Vacancies occurring in the offices of the Board will be filled as soon as practical.

ARTICLE VI – MEETING PROCEDURES

6.1 Quorum. A quorum shall be required to conduct a meeting of the Parks and Trails Board. A majority of four (4) or more of the members of the Board will constitute a quorum for the purpose of conducting a meeting and acting on agenda items.

6.2 Conflict of Interest. Whenever a member has a contractual and/or financial interest in matter before the Board, that member must declare the nature of such interest, abstain from all discussion related to the application or matter, and not vote on the application or matter, as provided in Article IX.

6.3 Agenda. The order of business at regular meetings shall generally be as follows:

- A. Call to Order
- B. Roll Call of Members
- C. Approval of the Agenda
- D. Approval of the Minutes of the Previous Meeting
- E. Public Comments
- F. Old/New Business
- G. Other Business
 - 1. Committee Reports
 - 2. Future Agenda Items
- H. Adjournment

ARTICLE VII – CODE OF ETHICS AND STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

7.1 Purpose. All members of the Board must adhere to the highest ethical standards, and the following standards of conduct in carrying out their duties.

7.2 Standards of Conduct.

- A. Members must not use the official position to secure special privileges or exemptions for themselves or others.
- B. Except as permitted by law, members must disclose a known potential conflict of interest for the public record and refrain from participating in the discussion and vote, when a matter comes before the Board that: 1) affects the member’s financial interests or those of a business with which the member is associated, unless the effect on the member or business is no greater than on other members of the same business classification, profession or occupation, or 2) affects the financial interests of an organization in which the member participates as a member of the governing body, unless the member serves in that capacity as the City’s representative.

C. Members may not act as an agent or attorney for another before the Wayzata City Council or a Wayzata Board or Commission in a matter where a conflict of interest exists or may exist.

D. Members may not knowingly accept or solicit, directly or indirectly, a gift or loan if state law prohibits this.

E. Members may accept expense reimbursement from the City for any City-approved training-related sessions or project reimbursement costs.

ARTICLE VIII – COMMITTEES

8.1 Standing Committees. There will be no standing committees of the Board.

8.2 Ad Hoc Committees. The Board may create ad hoc committees for a specific purpose and duration. The Board may request that the City Council appoint other members of the community to such committee, though at least one (1) member of the Board must be appointed to each committee.

ARTICLE IX – RECORDS

9.1 Minutes. The Secretary will prepare summary minutes of Board meetings. The City Clerk will be responsible for keeping a copy of the minutes with the records of the City.

9.2 Open Meetings. All meetings of the Parks and Trails Board shall be open/available to the public and a matter of public record, except such meetings that must or may be closed under State law.

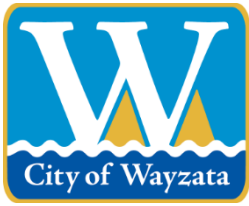
ARTICLE X – AMENDMENTS

10.1 Amendments. These Bylaws may be amended at any time by City Council upon recommendation of the Board or the Council's own initiative. The Board will review these Bylaws and any Parks and Trails policies and plans periodically, and will recommend amendments or alterations to City Council.

BACKGROUND:

Earlier this year, the Council discussed general security and conduct measures to be taken during public meetings in order to ensure that in the future all public meetings are safe, welcoming, and conducted in a professional manner that will allow robust public discourse and policy making.

As a part of that discussion, the Council directed staff to update its Code of Conduct for public meetings so the expectations of behavior are clear to both the public, staff, and the Council.

The last component of that discussion was to have some baseline behavioral guidelines for the Council and all of the appointed officials on the various boards, commissions, authorities, and committees to ensure everyone understands what their role and responsibilities are as well as the minimum expectation of behavior among each other, other City officials, staff, and the public.

The intent of these codes of conduct are to inform and to assist in guiding behavior of public officials. All members of the Council and appointed officials will be asked to read, acknowledge, and sign off as a part of the on-boarding process. All three of the documents were reviewed by the City's leadership team and City Attorney.

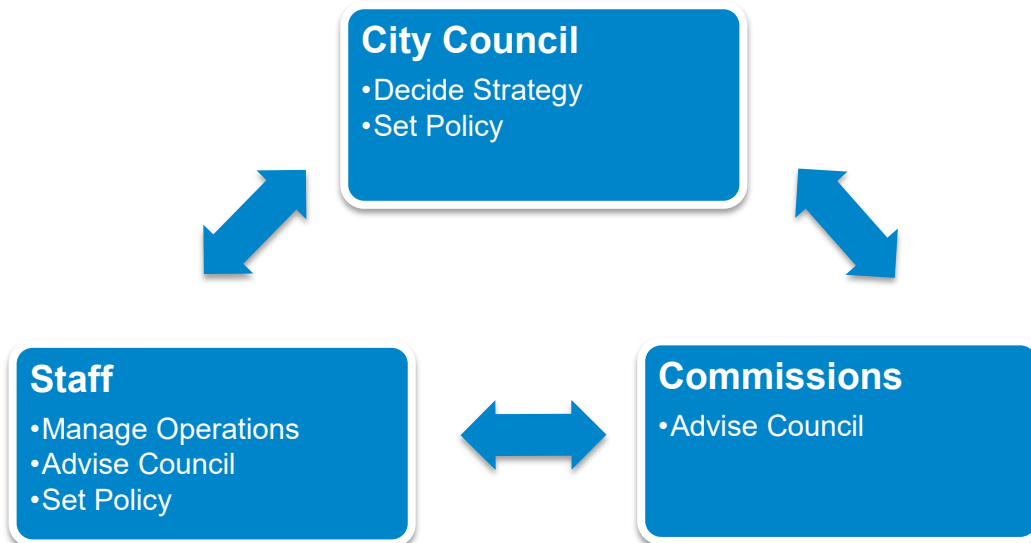

Code of Conduct for Wayzata City Council

(Adopted August 3, 2022)

This Code of Conduct policy has been adopted by the City Council to both (i) highlight the roles and responsibilities of Council members, City staff, and Boards and Commissions, and (ii) establish respectful behavior guidelines for working with each other, staff, and boards and commissions.

Working with Staff

City Council Members pledge to City Staff that they will:

- Respect the City Manager’s role, and provide clear and constructive direction to the City Manager, not attempting to direct the work of any individual staff member
- Respect staff as professionals and valued resources and members of the City’s team
- Support a positive and constructive workplace environment for City employees where staff are encouraged to work to their full potential
- When possible, notify the City Manager in advance of a Council Meeting of any new information related to an agenda item, as well as anticipated questions and requests to pull agenda items from the consent agenda, so the appropriate staff can compile the information needed
- Understand their role as public officials, and the need for transparency and openness in conducting the City’s business, and in communication with each other and with staff
- Direct all staff-related communications to and through the City Manager. In exceptional circumstances when that is not possible, copy the City Manager.

Working with Boards and Commissions

Wayzata's Boards and Commissions are established by the City Council, and their function is to advise the Council. They are to:

- Investigate matters within the scope of their bylaws, City Code provisions, and as directed by the Council
- Advise the Council by making findings and recommendations, and adopting reports
- At the direction of the Council or as required in City Code, hold public hearings, receive evidence, conduct research, and factor that into their decisions and recommendations for the Council

City Council Members pledge to City Boards and Commissions that they will:

- Treat Boards and Commissions as vitally important resources that support the decision-making process
- Communicate effectively with Boards and Commissions to ensure they have the tools needed to do their work
- Give clear direction, and take adequate time to review the reports and recommendations of Boards and Commissions
- Refrain from seeking to influence the deliberations or outcomes of Boards and Commissions
- Not typically attend meetings of Boards and Commissions unless:
 - as an observer (notifying the appropriate staff prior to attending); or
 - as a formally appointed Council liaison or a non-voting member

Code of Conduct Policy for the Public at City Meetings
(Adopted August 3, 2022)

This Code of Conduct policy has been adopted by the City Council to establish respectful behavior guidelines for all who attend and participate in public meetings.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Treat people with respect, courtesy, and kindness ● Speak in turn and only when recognized by the Mayor or Chair of the meeting ● Adhere to the rules of the Council Chambers or other meeting room, including the safety and health protocols of the City ● Adhere to time limits for speaking (typically 3 minutes) ● Focus comments on the subject matter of the agenda item ● Highlight information that will be relevant and helpful to the deliberation of Council, or the Board or Commission ● Recognize and respect differences of opinions 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Speaking over or cutting off another person's comments ● Speaking out of turn or shouting from the audience ● Insulting, disparaging comments, or putting down staff, Council/board members or others in public ● Using or displaying belittling, demeaning, judging or patronizing comments or body language ● Questioning motivations of others, even when there is a difference of opinion ● Violence or the threat of violence, which will not be tolerated ● Distracting or disruptive behavior, including moving around Council Chambers, not adhering to safety or health protocols, cheering/shouting

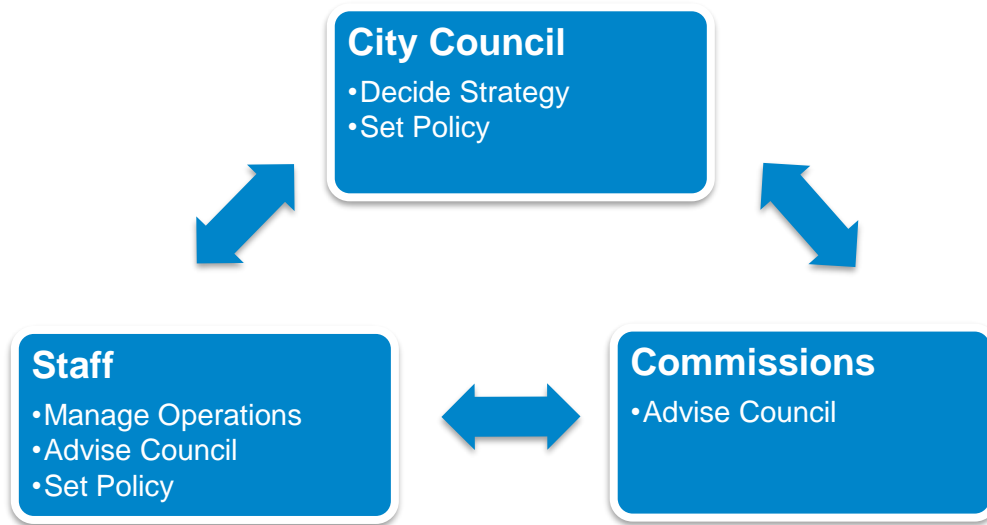
***Individuals who fail to honor these respectful behavior guidelines may be asked to leave the meeting, and the meeting may be recessed until such time as the individual/s have left the meeting and order has been restored by the Mayor, Chair, City Manager, and/or Staff Liaison.**



Code of Conduct for Boards and Commissions

(Adopted August 5, 2022)

This Code of Conduct policy has been adopted by the City Council to both (i) highlight the roles and responsibilities of Council members, City staff, and Boards and Commissions, and (ii) establish respectful behavior guidelines for working with each other, staff, and boards and commissions.

Working with Staff

Board and Commission Members pledge to City Staff that they will:

- Respect staff as professionals and valued resources and members of the City’s team and not direct their work
- Support a positive and constructive workplace environment for City employees where staff are encouraged to work to their full potential
- When possible, notify the staff liaison in advance of a Board Meeting of any new information related to an agenda item, as well as anticipated questions and requests to pull agenda items from the consent agenda, so the appropriate staff can compile the information needed
- Acknowledge and understand their role as public officials, and the need for transparency and openness in conducting the City’s business and in communication with each other and with staff

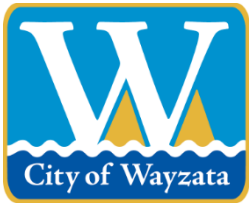

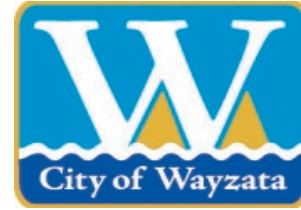
