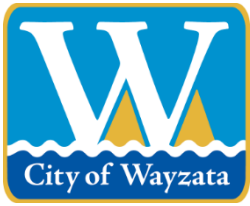

## Parks and Trails Board Meeting Minutes

Wednesday, March 15, 2023

**Attendees:** Chair Schalkle, Merrily Babcock, Sarah Randolph, Sarah Showalter, Jon Erickson, and Bianca Jensen.

**Staff:** Parks Planner, Nick Kieser

1. **Call to Order and Roll Call:** Meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM.
2. **Approval of Agenda:** Amendments were offered to add discussion of Excelsior docks, Spring Splash, Wayzata Boulevard Corridor Study, Beach drainage, Adirondack chairs, and Panoway update. A motion to accept the agenda as amended by Chair Schalkle and seconded by Randolph. Approved 6-0.
3. **Approval of Minutes:** A motion to approve the November 16, 2022 minutes by Chair Schalkle and seconded by Randolph. Approved 6-0.  
A motion to approve the February 15, 2023 minutes as amended by Schalkle and seconded by Babcock. Approved 6-0.
4. **Public Comments:** The Board greeted new member Bianca Jensen and learned about her interest in serving on the Board.
5. **Old Business.**
  - a. **Memorial Tree Program/Earth Day Tree Giveaway.** Babcock gave an update on the event and passed around draft flyers to promote the event. Promotion of the event will be in the Wayzata Portal, Wayzata Weekly, social media, a Facebook event created, and put up on the website. Babcock noted that flyers will also be passed around local businesses for their customers to see.
  - b. **Maple Tree Tapping.** Babcock gave an update that there have been 89 people have signed up for approximately 30 available spots. Babcock has helped some of the participants already tap a tree. IDs will be checked at the event to ensure that the equipment will be returned once the tapping is complete.

- c. **Review WSB Proposal for Klapprich Park Design Development and Construction Documents.** Staff reviewed the attached WSB proposal to create a comprehensive plan for Klapprich park with the additions since the previous Board review and discussion. Chair Schalkle and staff noted the potential cost and operations of a more permanent ice-skating rink. The construction of the projects is planned for 2024, but the exact timeline will be reviewed as the comprehensive plan is created. A motion to recommend approval of the WSB proposal as shown by Chair Schalkle and seconded by Erickson. Approved 6-0. Staff noted the proposal will be on the March 21 City Council meeting for their review and approval.
- d. **Recommend Bell Courts Tennis Courts Reconstruction Option.** The Board reviewed the updated Bell Courts concept plan to incorporate four dedicated pickleball courts while keeping two tennis courts which will be discussed at the March 23 Community Open House. The Board noted that they would like to verify there is a western gate to the restroom facilities. Depending on the feedback at the Open House, staff will work on an updated plan with WSB for further review or start creating the construction documents.

**6. New Business.**

- a. **CIP Discussion.** The Board reviewed the upcoming CIP items in the Parks and Trails Fund.
  - i. Board proposed we do not go forward with the following CIP projects:
    - a) Big Woods Trail
    - b) Wayfinding Signage Study – not out of the Parks and Trails funds
  - ii. Board proposed we delay the following CIP projects:
    - a) Locust Hills Park – Identify Future Needs
    - b) Nature Feasibility Study
  - iii. Board proposed we get more insight before spending on:
    - a) Wrought Iron Fence Maintenance

A motion to recommended approval of the items listed above by Chair Schalkle and seconded by Erickson. Approved 6-0.

- b. **Spring Splash.** Showalter asked if the Board would be interested in participating in the Spring Splash event again this year. The event is scheduled for Saturday, May 20 from 11:00 am – 1:00 pm. Showalter and Jensen noted that they could participate in the event at a Parks and Trails booth. Staff can bring cornhole and any additional materials needed.
- c. **Adirondack Chairs.** The Board stated that they would like to determine how many chairs are currently available and their condition to determine if more need to be ordered. Staff will get this information to discuss at the next meeting.
- d. **Beach Drainage.** The Board discussed the Beach drainage pipe to determine next steps. Jensen noted that the drainage pipe is a significant attraction for the kids to play with so

it should not be removed. Staff will pass along the idea to make the drainage pipe more attractive and to inspect the spray feature when it is turned on.

- e. **Excelsior Docks.** Randolph and staff relayed the information that was provided by the Excelsior City Manger, Kristi Luger. Excelsior generates funding from their docks in a number of ways; meter parking, Duffy Boats, excursion boats, charter boats, and winter storage. With the Panoway project, the Dock Design Working Group is looking into these options to generate funding from the new dock system. The Board noted the interest in a rental boat system, like Duffy Boats, that could be incorporated at the Depot Docks.
- f. **Panoway Update.** Staff stated that construction of Phase II of Panoway will start this summer once all the permits have been received. Construciton is planned to start on the west side and move east toward the Broadway Docks. Construction documents have also been created for the Section Foreman House so once funding has been received, the reconstruction project can start for the House.

**7. Other Business.**

- a. **Communications Recap.** Staff has sent out information regarding the Bell Courts Open House and will continue to promote the event. All Board members are welcome and encouraged to attend the Open House.

**8. Adjourn.** Chair Schalkle made a motion to adjourn and seconded by Randolph. Approved 6-0.

# KLAPPRICH PARK + BELL COURTS

## EXISTING CONDITIONS

Klapprich Park is at the center of the Wayzata park system located off of Wayzata Boulevard and Minnetonka Avenue North. Klapprich Park is considered an “active park” and includes many facilities including picnic tables, a softball diamond, a multi-use field, a permanent hockey rink that serves as a seasonal off-leash dog park, a warming house, a large hill for sledding and viewing the park, and a playground. Being restricted in size, the ball diamond is predominantly used by younger children. The multiuse field is in good condition, but is left unstriped, making it available for casual use and pick-up games. This park attracts users all year with the hockey rink, and a popular, but unofficial sledding hill during the winter months. The warming house is open 3:00-10:00pm on weekdays and 10:00am-10:00pm on weekends and when school is not in session. The warming house is small and fairly distant from the hockey rink. The playground has two traditional structures that are in fair condition, but do not meet current ADA accessibility standards. A few picnic tables, surrounded by a number of large shade trees, are also located near the playground.

Bell Courts is adjacent to Klapprich Park and separated only by Park Street East. Bell Courts Park, originally called the Tourist Park by local residents, features three striped tennis courts, two of which are striped to accommodate pickleball; two bocce courts; and a grill and picnic tables. The bocce courts are popular with local residents and are currently reserved in the summer by the bocce leagues. The Louise H. Bell cabana overlooking the courts was a gift to the city in the mid-1960s from the James Ford Bell family. This facility has recently been renovated with restrooms.

The City Water tower and water treatment facility are located on the site as well as several existing telecommunication facilities. These telecommunication utilities have future plans for relocation to the City’s new monopole, but have been designed around for this plan.

## THE PROPOSED DESIGN

Klapprich Park and Bell Courts are intended to be utilized in a similar fashion as today, but with improvements that will create more opportunities for year-round and multi-generational use. Currently, the north and east sides of Klapprich Park are disjointed with steep grades and few walking paths.

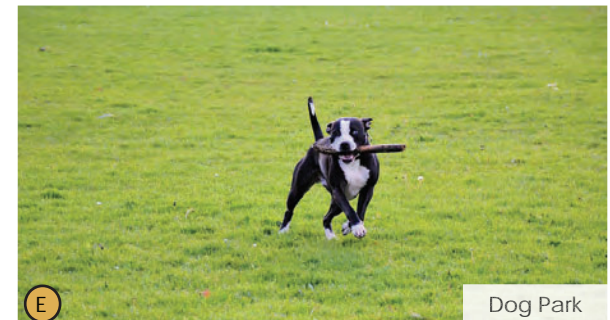
The current maintenance drive is proposed to be modified to allow for drop-off and additional ADA accessible parking spaces adjacent to the proposed playground. The outdated and inaccessible playground is proposed to be replaced with an ADA accessible route for inclusive play built into the hillside. Play options will be expanded with a new nature play element tucked into the trees near the top of the hill.

The existing softball diamond will remain for casual play and use by youth teams. The existing hockey rink/ dog park is to remain in its current configuration.

Klapprich Park Plan proposed to provide several winter recreational opportunities, including the current ice skating and sledding activities.

Bell Courts will retain its primary uses, but this master plan will expand the tennis court and move the bocce courts to accommodate four new pickleball courts, while retaining two doubles tennis courts. Minimal improvements to the north side of Bell Courts Park include additional screening between adjacent residences and an additional butterfly garden surrounding the existing water tower.

Additional street improvements are proposed to accommodate safer crossings and dedicated bike sharrow lanes.

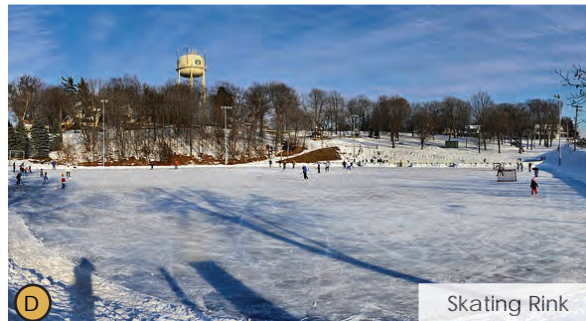

### **BACKGROUND:**

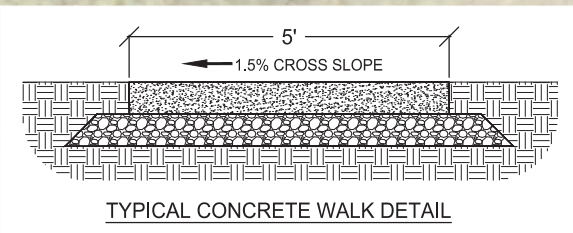
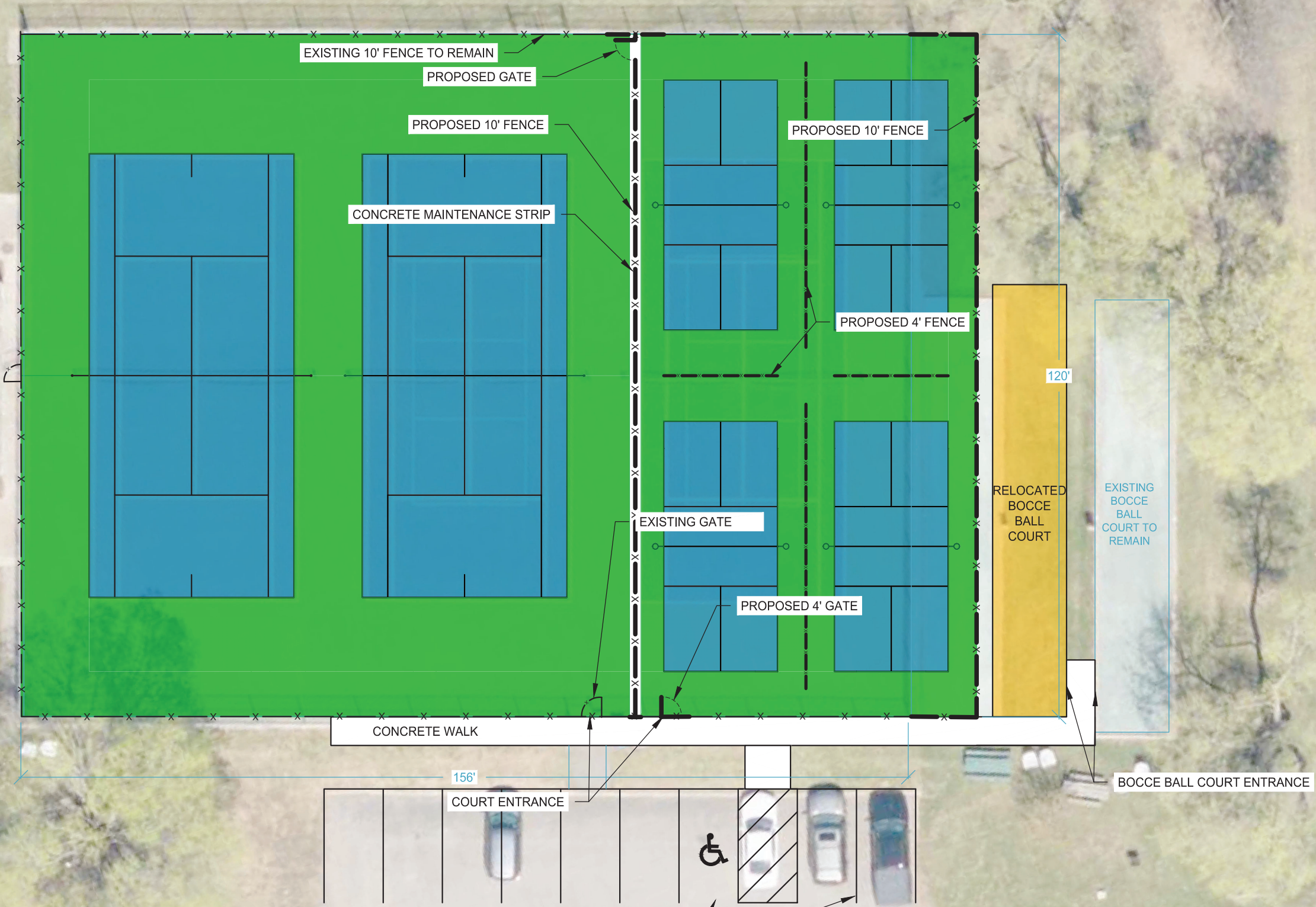
At the Open House on March 23, staff and WSB discussed the preferred Bell Courts concept plan with approximately 15 stakeholders. A summary of the comments and questions at the open house is attached to the packet for review. Additional comments were received by staff after the open house which are also attached for the Board to review.

In response to the comments, WSB put together two concept plans that the Board can discuss and ultimately recommend to the City Council to put out to bid. The difference between the two concept plans is the location of the pickleball courts either on the east side of the project area or the west side.

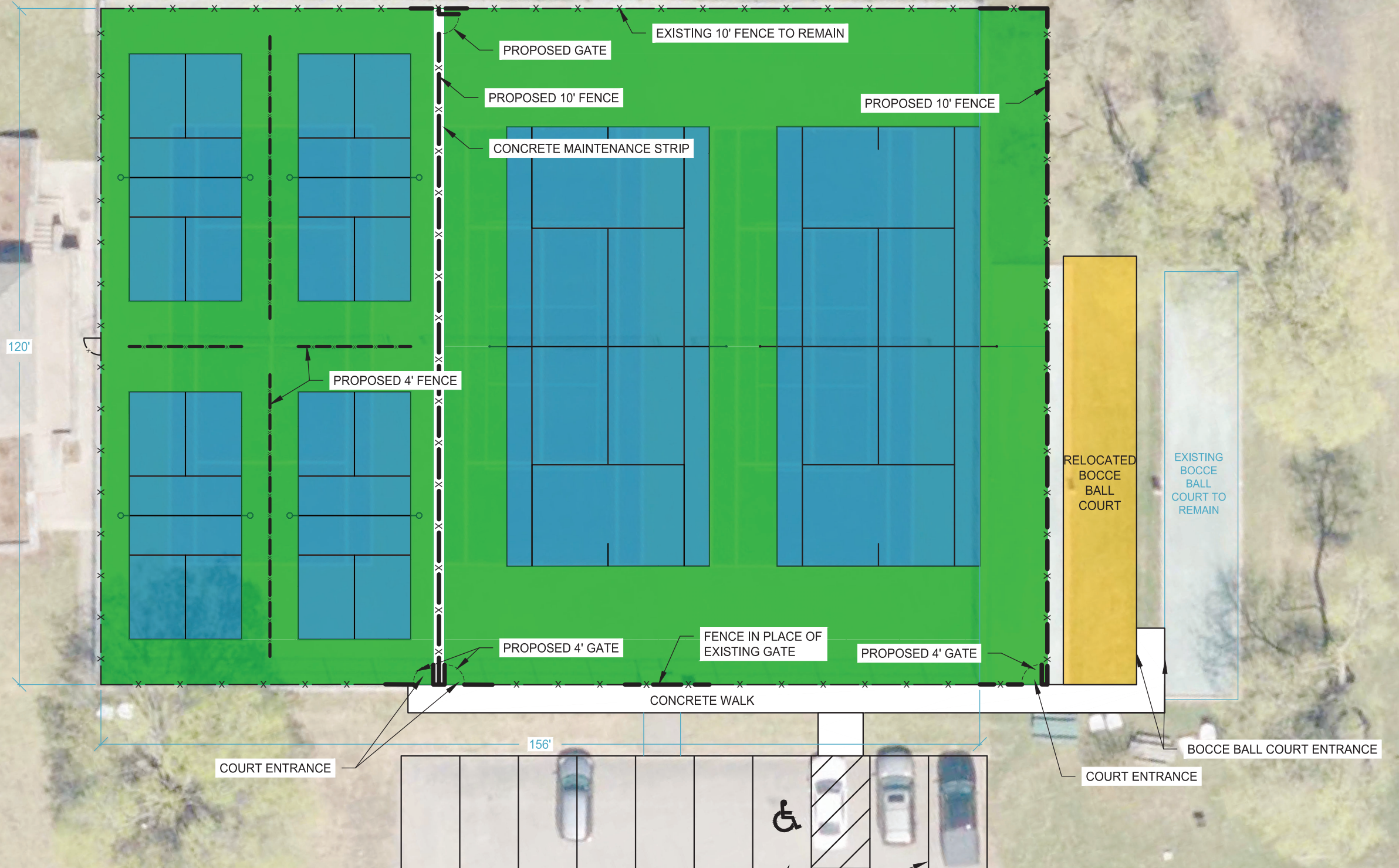

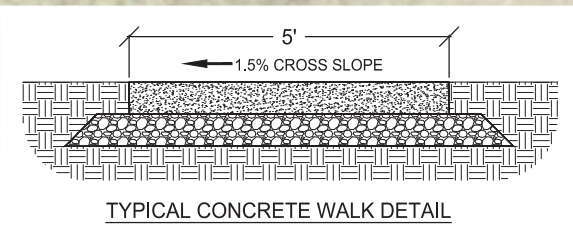

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Nick, please see comments recorded for the Pickleball Court Open House held on Thursday March 23, 2023 from 5:00 – 6:00 p.m. Feel free to let me know if you have any additional items or edits to this document.

- Include additional amenities like paddle racks, drinking fountain, benches, etc.
- Expand parking to the east for additional spaces. Parallel parking along other streets?
- Sidewalk connection to restroom / shelter building from parking lot.
- Low fence along west side for viewing from shelter.
- Are two bocce courts necessary?
- Could pickleball courts be on the east side, more buffering from west neighbors and building would help block noise to north homes?
- Any improvements to help with noise (mats were mentioned)?
- Concerns with lack of parking. If all courts are used the minimum parking needs would be 24 spaces. Likely more than this with people rotating in and out for pickleball.
- Revisit the option of locating pickleball at the middle school
- Is there a way to allow for tennis to still work at the pickleball location (removable nets, etc.)?
- Save the trees, no more trees should be removed for this project.
- Verify with adjacent properties if added evergreen trees would be desired or left open to park.
- Would hours be restricted during weekdays and/or weekends for neighbors?
- Is there any information on type of use for the courts? Is it a small group that uses the courts frequently or a large group that occasionally uses the courts?
- No lights.
- Stager construction between the two facilities so both courts are not offline at the same time.
- More room for pickleball courts, remove divider fence along sides to add more space (5' seems tight and would like to do this right).
- Management of the courts, reservations are used now which works for tennis but pickleball is more of an open play environment.
  - o Include open play hours if reservations are maintained, culture of the game.
  - o Ensure groups don't over reserve courts and no slots available to others.

Ilja Gregor – March 27, 2023

Thank you for the update.

As you expect, I do have some thoughts on the suggestions that came out of the meeting.

First, I should explain one big difference between how people come to play Pickleball versus Tennis. Pickleball is a “drop-in” sport where people show up and play with whomever. This is what makes it such a social sport and people meet other people. Tennis players most often come as a group of 4 or 2 and play only with the people they came with. However there are times when Pickleballers also come as a foursome but not that often.

Because of the social aspect of Pickleball and people just showing up and waiting their turn to play, the pavilion makes an ideal area to wait and mingle with other waiting players. At Lone Lake Park where there are 8 courts, often there are over 20 players waiting and mingling. Pickleball games are short in duration, 10-15 minutes usually so court turn over is relatively fast.

Anyway, that is why my vote is to keep the Pickleball court next to the pavilion.

Mesh Fabric: yes we should look into it. May see how bad the noise is first. Also, I would prohibit play before 8 am and with no lights, the evening play time would also be limited.

Reservations: as I pointed out, Pickleball is a drop in sport so no reservations.

Fencing: if Wayzata wants top quality courts then have fencing on all sides. If you decide to not have sideline fencing then 6’ space to the perimeter fences and 8’ between the courts. If you do go with fencing, 3’6” fencing has about the same affect as 4’ fencing, maybe you could save a couple bucks there.

Restrooms: no opinion other than they should be identified.

Benches: good idea to have seating for those players waiting for the next game. Again, Pickleball is a drop in and wait for the next game activity.

Finally, plan on installing a paddle rack where waiting players can place their paddles for the next game when a court opens up.

One thought on the consultants; I hope some of them are Pickleball players or at least went to visit Lone Lake Park or Starring Lake Park courts during the season to see how these venues are designed because they are pretty good. It’s one thing to be a conceptual designer but another to have lived and played in various venues to know what is good and what is not.

No matter the location, the #1 consideration of placing Courts has to be noise and its effect on neighbors' peace.

How could anyone be against Pickleball except for the noise factor?

I am very concerned about the noise for myself and my neighbors, who are closer than me.

The following article is by Bob Unetich, a Certified referee and column writer for USA Pickleball Magazine.

He addresses:

*"Respecting our neighbors – creating a quieter pickleball environment,"*

Here is one excerpt:

"Frequent pickleball sounds are typically about 70 dBA at about 100 feet away from the strike of the ball.

Residents in homes located in a quiet residential area, that are within 100 feet from pickleball courts are used to noise levels of 40 dBA, therefore, the level of pickleball noise is 30 decibels louder."

"And, remember, each time you increase a sound level by 10 decibels, it will sound twice as loud."

"So, an increase of 30 decibels is (10dB+10dB+10dB) or 2x as loud x 2x as loud x 2x as loud, or 8 times as loud."

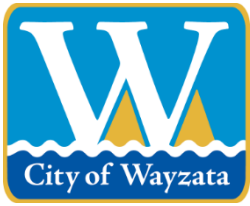
"That's a significant increase in loudness. **Would that be annoying? Probably.**"

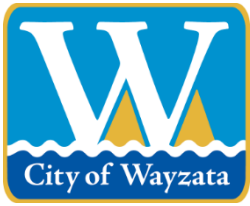

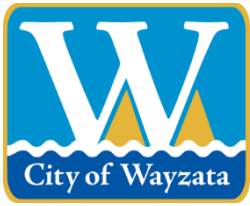

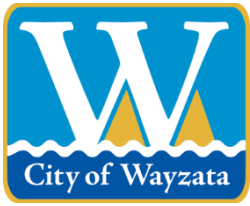
**BACKGROUND:**

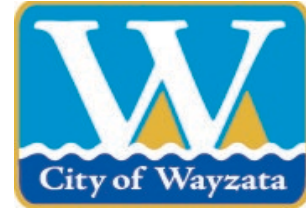
